1.1 Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. (Explain in 500 words):

At present, the college offers eleven undergraduate courses in Arts, Humanities and Commerce. The college holds the unique distinction of being the forerunner in launching most sought after four professional courses of the University of Delhi including B.A. (Hons.) Hindi Journalism and Mass Communication (1994-95) and B.A. (Hons.) Social Work and B.A. (Hons.) Business Economics (1995-96) and B.A. (Hons.) Applied Psychology (2007-08). In B.A. Programme and B.Com, the vocational courses like Functional Hindi, Human Resource Management (HRM) and Office Management and Secretarial Practices (OMSP) are offered.

The College has the mechanism for well-planned curriculum delivery and documentation and thereby monitors the growth and progress in order to evaluate the academic performance and contribution and continuously takes necessary steps for the purpose of improving the present situation.

The College implements the curriculum developed and assigned by University of Delhi and passed by the Academic and Executive Councils of the University. All the parent departments involve the respective subject teachers from our College in Curriculum Development Committee, Committee of Courses and some as members of Boards of Research Studies (BRS). Besides, the College develops a number of effective strategies and action plan to implement the curriculum effectively. The College facilitate the proper implementation of the curriculum with the help of the library which is fully equipped with reference books, magazines and newspapers. The academic curriculum is supplemented with invited lectures & workshops by distinguished experts from different fields and industrial visits, rural camps, historical visits and field work which provide healthy exposure to practical aspects of life. This leads to building up of a healthy interface between classroom teaching and curriculum thereby complimenting the students' knowledge base. The orientation programme at the commencement of the session, regular interactions with distinguished alumni and conferences provide platform for inclusive learning. The College has fully equipped four computer labs with latest and original softwares in order to update students with fast changing technology.

In order to enrich teachers' knowledge, develop their core competencies and add value to the teachinglearning practices, the University of Delhi and its departments hold workshops, discussion on case studies, refresher courses and career development/orientation programmes for teachers at regular intervals. Such interventions are useful in retaining academic flexibility and also curriculum revision and enrichment.

2.3.2 Students mentoring system available in the institution?

The college has various mechanisms to mentor or advise students. A Counselling Centre has been working in the college to counsel the students. The primary purpose of the Counselling Centre is to provide psychological support to the students. There are some other committees which also cater specialized requirement of students and counsel them at different levels i.e. student council advisory committee, Gender sensitization, & Women Development Committee, North-East Student Advisory Committee and Foreign Student Advisory Committee. Various programmes have been organized by these committees during this academic session. CRITERION-VI: GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1 Mention two practices of decentralization and participative management during the last year: The college is committed to a culture of participative management in its functioning. The Governing Body consists of nominees of the Delhi Govt along with representatives of the University, two representatives of the teachers and one representative of the non-teaching staff on a rotational basis and Principal as a Member Secretary. The Teacher-in-Charge of each department is appointed on rotational basis for a period of one year. The Teacher-in-Charge in consultation with the Principal and various committees coordinates the activities pertaining to academic, cultural and extra-curricular development of students and in the functioning of college. There is also the post of Bursar whose appointment is made by the governing body. The Bursar takes decisions in consultation with the Principal and accounts department in financial matters. There are students elections held on yearly basis and the student union elected through a democratic process also helps the Principal in issues related to student management. The Administrative Officer appointed in the college also helps in the smooth functioning of student activities, and preparation of the time-table are taken by the various committees of the Staff Council. The Staff Council meets on a regular basis and is an open forum for the entire faculty whether ad-hoc or permanent to express their views, ideas and opinions. The decisions taken through a democratic and participative process in Staff Council are binding and have to be followed by all the members.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

Curriculum Development

The College implements the curriculum developed and assigned by University of Delhi and passed by the Academic and Executive Council of the University. The parent department involves the respective subject teachers to discuss the formulation and improvisation of curriculum and related reference books. In all parent departments, faculty members from our college have actively participated as members in Curriculum Development Committees, Committee of Courses & some as members of Boards of Research Studies (BRS).

Teaching and Learning

Apart from direct engagement of classes by teachers, college also facilitates e-learning through availing exisiting infrastructure to the students. The computer systems are available in the computer labs as well as in the library to facilitate the students for preparing their projects, presentations, assignments etc. and also to get the access to the e-information.

Examination and Evaluation

The process of evaluation is divided into two parts. 25% weightage has been given to the internal evaluation and 75% weightage is given to external evaluation. Internal evaluation includes 5% weightage of the attendance. There is very little scope to change process of evaluation at the college level as it is all mandated and managed by the University. The evaluation of external exam papers is done by the teachers who are part of the affiliated colleges of University of Delhi.

Research and Development

The college staff can avail study leave for the PhD, research work, training programme and workshops as per the rules of the University. The staff is always motivated to attend and organize the seminars, conferences and other academic events for the betterment of them and the institution too. The academic staffs are motivated to apply for different grants available for research.

Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation

The College Library is a vast repository of books and periodicals of various subjects for the benefit of the students and academic staff. Following are the salient features of the library:

-ICT: There are total of 128 Desktop PCs; 851 Laptops and 2 Servers. Apart from that the College has a total of 32 Printers; 2 Scanners; 27 LCD Projectors; 2 UPS (10 KVA) and 10 UPS (5KVA), 01 Cannon Xerox Machine. Computer and Internet facility is made available to the faculty members and students in the campus. Computer aided teaching-learning material is available to staff and students in the classrooms, computer labs and library to facilitate extensive use of ICT resources. There are 26 CCTV cameras installed in the Library.

Human Resource Management:

Human resources are managed as per the University Guidelines and the established administrative practices. The community is motivated to undertake research while involving students and attend seminars, conferences and refresher courses, etc.

Industry Interaction / Collaboration: The Department of Social Work directly interacts with the NGOs and places its students for internships also. The Department of Business Economics interacts with the industry and undertakes industrial tours.

Admission of Students

Admission committee is a core committee of the college. It consists of teachers-in-charge of various departments and conveners of many other admission related committees. It includes document verification committee, special category admissions (SC/ST/OBC/PwD, etc.) through enabling committee, sports committee, and extra-curricular activities (ECA) committee. In the college 5% seats are reserved under sports and ECA quota, which is divided between them in the ratio of 2/3 and 1/3, respectively; and the college also gives a relaxation of 1% marks to women candidates. All other category seats are reserved according to Delhi University rules. For admission in 11 different courses of the college the University of Delhi rules and regulations are followed. As per University Notification the college constitutes its own Admission Grievance Committee to address the grievances of students and parents.

- Planning and Development: College administration is a collective responsibility with Principal being the Chief Executive Officer. The Staff is governed as per the plans, policies and regulations framed by the University of Delhi. The Information Technology is used to the maximum extent through e-mails, online procedures and uploading of the information on the college website. The student and staff data system is in operation. The pay role management system is in progress.
- Administration: General college governance is a collective responsibility and administrative matters are handled collectively through committees of teachers. There are about 46 committees for this purpose. Administration takes regular feedbacks to facilitate good administrative practices and ensure transparent governance. College administration uploads all the required information including documents, notices, and University communications etc. on the college website from time to time to maintain transparency and also makes use of online platform, email and WhatsApp.
- Finance and Accounts: Accounting and financial transparency is ensured through compliance of GFR 2017 rules and Government Guidelines applicable from time to time. Purchasing is done

through GeM (Government e-Marketplace). All money transactions are made through RTGS, direct payments etc. All accounts are audited by External auditors (CAG, GNCTD).

Student Admission and Support

College follows the online admission process managed by the University of Delhi. The payment of admission fees is done through online mode.

Examination

The examination form, hall admission ticket and roll numbers are assigned to the students through online process which is managed by the Examination Department of the University of Delhi. There is no scope of change in the examination process by the college as it is all managed by University itself. The collection of Examination fees is done through online mode.

2. Paper Recycling Unit

College is an academic institution where the use of paper is integral. Students use paper for various purposes such as class notes, assignments, class tests etc. A considerable quantity of paper is also used in different administrative departments. Most of the used paper was earlier thrown in the dustbin and got wasted. It was realized that when a paper can be recycled and reused for a number of times then why not to have paper recycling machine in the college itself and train the students. Keeping in view the same the paper recycling unit has been established.

The main function of the paper recycling unit is to recycle the used paper disposed off by the students, staff and different sections/departments of the college (administrative, accounts, computers, library, Principal's office as well as different academic subject departments). It aims at providing training to the students and the teaching and non-teaching staff to make paper by their own hands by using the waste paper of the college. This would raise awareness among all the members of the college community towards paper saving. The recycling of paper would keep the campus clean and help to protect trees and thus contribute to save environment.

In the paper recycling unit, the College has a manual paper recycling machine installed in a separate room where the students come for paper making training. They themselves prepare the pulp for making paper and carry out the whole process till they put the paper in the pressing machine. Different colours are mixed in the pulp to get different coloured papers. Some chemicals and bleaching powder are mixed in different proportions for getting different varieties of paper. We prepare many items from the recycled paper such as A4 size sheets, envelops, file covers, visiting cards, pen covers, diary etc.

There are clear indications that students are getting aware about the proper use of paper. It also includes the idea that they should not waste paper at all. This is evident from the fact that every year during the student union elections some of the students prefer not to use paper at all during the election campaigns in the college. Generally it is realized that such students carrying out a paperless campaign are well recognized by the student voters so much so that some of them even won the elections. Some teachers have successfully motivated the students to submit the assignments by using the recycled paper sheets. The invitation letters to the guests are also sent on our own recycled paper which is always appreciated by the distinguished guests visiting the college.

One of the problems is the staff crunch to run the paper recycling unit. We have only one staff assigned for this job. Secondly, it takes a lot of efforts to motivate the students and co-ordinate their activities. Also the machines and instruments used are manual and not very advanced. So it involves a lot of physical activity.

The College came into existence in 1991 and celebrated its Silver Jubilee in 2016. Our motto, "Atto Deepo Bhava" (be your own light) motivates us to always work with dedication to enlighten ourselves and to the society's betterment. So, we have evolved from a humble beginning with few courses, faculty and students with the objective to inculcate honesty and dedication. The College provides ample opportunities to the students from different streams to mingle together in academic as well as sports, cultural and other extra-curricular activities organized through different societies and clubs. The spirit of mutual work, discipline, social responsibility towards community development and nation building is inculcated through Eco-Club, NSS, NCC etc. The College contributes towards women empowerment by organizing various activities under the aegis of its Gender Sensitization and Women Development Committee. The nature care and environmental awareness is being promoted by Eco-Club and its members. The Herbal and Rose Garden, Paper Recycling Unit and Solar Water Heater are the unique examples of our eco-friendly behaviour. The College encourages its faculty and students to participate in seminars and conferences and promote a holistic teaching-learning environment. They are further facilitated by our infrastructural facilities including four fully functional computer labs, well-stocked computerized library and an auditorium equipped with multi-media facility. In order to improve IT infrastructure and teaching methodology, the College has also installed 19 multi-media projectors in the class rooms and computer labs. In addition, the College facilitates regular interactions through seminars, workshops, special lectures etc. or a healthy and vast exposure to our students.

- 2. Facilitate the College Administration for creating a good database for enhancing and maintaining the quality culture.
- 3. Restructure the College Annual Report to reflect the tangible results achieved in the key areas of the institution such as teaching, learning, research, extension and support activities, etc. in tune with Annual Quality Assurance Report (AQAR).
- 4. Organize workshops, seminars on quality related themes and promotion of quality aspects for teaching and non-teaching staff of the College.
