Profile of the College

Dr. Bhim Rao Ambedkar College is a co-educational constituent college of the University of Delhi, which was established by the Government of NCT of Delhi in the trans-Yamuna area in 1991 to cater to the needs of higher education in a school building of Geeta Colony. In 2001, it shifted to the present building for which the foundation stone was laid by the then Hon'ble Vice-President of India (Hon'ble Sh. K. R. Narayanan Ji). It is spread over 9 acres including the residential area having 12 staff quarters.

With the student strength of about 2500, it has got about 111 faculty members and about 57 regular members of the administrative staff besides a few contractual and ad-hoc/deputational staff.

The college offers a number of professional and honours courses like Business Economics, Hindi Journalism and Mass Communication, Applied Psychology, Social Work, Commerce, Geography and History in addition to B.A. (Programme) and B.Com. Urdu as an elective subject and B.A. (H) History are introduced with effect from 2016-17. In the academic session 2017-18 two new courses namely B.A.(Hons.) Hindi and B.A.(Hons.) Economics have been introduced.

The College is privileged to have WUS Health Centre in its premises to look after the health care needs of students of Delhi University and its college employees.

The University has selected the College as one of the Regional-cum-Study Centre to facilitate undergraduate teaching for School of Open Learning (SOL) students and also for girls students of Non-Collegiate Women's Education Board (NCWEB, University of Delhi).

The College is one of the Centres of Rajiv Gandhi National Institute of Youth Development, Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports, Tamil Nadu which offers one year Post Graduate Diploma in Youth Development (PGDYD).

The College is one of the 20 Earthquake Strong Ground Motion Stations in Delhi for recording and monitoring the earthquakes in Delhi under the project jointly handled by Director of Seismology Division (DST) - DU - IIT (Roorkee).

In 2015-16 the College celebrated its Silver Jubilee. The College organized a number of activities to prepare students for the future through training beyond class room besides organizing cultural and sports events and an orientation programme was conducted 20th July 2016 for the newly admitted students. Similarly, this year college conducted orientation programme for new students on 20th July, 2017.

CRITERIA ACTIVITIES

CRITERION-I: CURRICULUM ASPECTS

The College implements the curriculum developed and assigned by University of Delhi and passed by the Academic and Executive Councils of the University. The parent departments involve the respective subject teachers to discuss the formulation and improvisation of curriculum and related reference books.

In all parent departments, faculty members from our college have actively participated as members in Curriculum Development Committee, Committee of Courses & some as members of Boards of Research Studies (BRS). As reported in SSR 36 faculty members or 46% of the permanent faculty has worked as members in these committees.

New Courses and Papers Introduced:

- A new language paper, Urdu was introduced in B.A.(Prog.) in the academics Session 2016-17.
- In the academic session 2016-17, a new Honours course namely B.A.(Hons.) History has been introduced.
- In the academic session 2017-18, two new Honours courses namely B.A.(Hons.) Hindi & B.A.(Hons.) Economics have been introduced.

To fulfill the objective of CBCS scheme every department of the college offers Generic Elective Paper. A Generic Elective paper is chosen by students generally from an unrelated discipline.

Catering to Student Diversity:

With a view to provide suitable enabling environment to all those students with special needs and coming from deprived background, the following endeavors have been made by the college since the academic session 2016-17 :

- An awareness program on 'Empowerment and Rehabilitation of Divyangjan' (differently abled persons) was organized by the Alumni Club in September 2016, in collaboration with the Pandit Deendyal Upadhyay National Institute of Physically Handicapped.
- A cabin is provided for the exclusive use of differently abled students in the library with Braille Study materials.
- 'Sugamya Pustakalay' facility has been started for Divyangjan.
- During the academic session 2016-17, 200 books were provided to 60 economically weaker and brilliant students under Students Aid Fund Scheme.
- A cultural program, 'Divyang Mahotsav' was organized by the Enabling unit of the college on 24th Jan., 2017, in which song, dance, skit and fashion shows were held.
- The Enabling unit celebrated the legendry French Educator, Louis braille's birth anniversary on 4th Jan., 2017. It was marked with slogan and poster making competition on the topic 'Disable' in which approximately 25 students of the Enabling unit participated with lot of enthusiasm.
- Student Welfare/Fee Concession Committee, during 2016-17 recommended 14 students for special financial assistance to ensure continuity of their education.

The above Table reflects that 77.03% (57/74) of permanent faculty members have sharpened and upgraded their skills through refresher courses and orientation programmes.

Teaching-Learning Process:

Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) of the college held its second meeting on 25th June, 2016. In that meeting, the following important decisions were taken:

- The SSR was presented before the committee, which made valuable suggestions after discussing the report.
- The College was advised that all documents, papers and information used for the SSR should be well documented and properly filed, so as to make these readily available for the NAAC visiting team; and, every teacher should prepare his/her profile with documentary proof.
- The College was authorized by the committee to make use of PWD or its vendors to get the college Water Harvesting Unit operational.
- The college was advised that the vocational programs for women, such as tailoring, dress-making and embroidery should be revived and college should re-launch these, on its own, if no external finances are available.
- The college was also advised to make the building inclusive, and buy the required number of disabled-friendly equipment.
- It was suggested by the committee that special care should be taken to maintain cleanliness of the premises and the washrooms.

The IQAC organized a One Day Workshop on 'Enhancement of Skills in Administrative and Financial Management' for Non-teaching staff of the University of Delhi & its affiliated Colleges/ Deptts. /Institutes on 25th February, 2017.

- Large number of Officers and Staff from Administrative and Financial departments of different Colleges and Institutes of Delhi University attended the Workshop and they were given certificates of participation.

A number of distinguished speakers like Prof. J.M. Khurana, Former Dean, students Welfare, DU; Sh. B. Dhanesh, Dy. Director, DOPT; Dr. Vikas Gupta, Joint Registrar (Council), DU; Ms. Meenakshi Sahai, Dy. Registrar, DU; Dr. P.C. Jain, Former Principal, Shri Ram College of Commerce and Dr. S.R. Oberoi, Former DUTA President and Associate Professor (Retd.), Rajdhani College, DU; were invited to speak on various subjects related to day to day college administrative and financial matters such as Pay Fixation, General Financial Rules (GFR), Documentation and Record Management, and RTI.

This table shows that more than 3/4th of the students have obtained the first and the second divisions in the year 2016 in all the courses offered by the college. This reflects the consistency in the trend of results of final year students in the last couple of years, in almost all the courses. Further, it is important to highlight that out of these, more than 80% students secured the first division in the following courses: B.Com (H) FYUP, B.A. (H) Hindi, B.A.(H)Applied Psychology, B.A.(H) Geography and B.A.(H) BMS.

- Recent measures and initiatives taken by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance are:
 1. In tune with the policies of National and State Government to spread Yoga across educational institutions, a separate yoga committee has been formed. The Committee has organised a number of activities including the celebration of the International

Yoga day in the college ground on 21st June, 2016, wherein around 100 college student performed various yoga asanas. The activity was a joint effort of the college and Bhartiya Yoga Sansthan. The college is also imparting yoga training to the students regularly (every day from 07:45am to 08:45 am).

2. The various companies visited the college campus during the year 2016-17, include: e-wards, India meets India, Teach for India ,City Walks, Genpact , My Operator, Gandhi Fellowship, Extramarks, KVC Consultants, Policy Bazar, Lazarro HR Solution, S&P Global, Exito HR Solution, and Noida Power Company.
3. Department of Business Economics conducted two- day work shop on ‘Data analysis using R Studio’ directed by Vaibhav garg (Alumni BBE).
4. Industrial visit of BBE Students to Unilever Limited (MP) during 2016-17.
5. The college has launched an International Multidisciplinary Bi – annual journal “ACADEMIA” in social sciences, humanities and language. It has an ISSN number.
6. NSS unit of the college having about 125 volunteers, involved in the following activities:
 - NSS day celebration and slogan writing competition on the theme of “Ill effects of Drug Addiction (Substance abuse)” (26th September 2016);
 - Voters Enrolment Drive (6th September, October 6th and 20th, 2016);
 - Five NSS volunteers attended training programme on enrolment process of youth electors on 29th September,2016;
 - ‘Rashtriya Ekta Saptah’ celebration from 31th October- 6th november2016;
 - Observed ‘Vigilance Awareness Week’, and organized debate competition on ‘Role of Youth in Curbing Corruption’ in collaboration with Oriental Bank of Commerce on 2nd November 2016;
 - Programme on ‘Emergency Response Preparedness’ to minimize loss of life, reduce damages in the situation of disaster and emergencies (10th november2016);
 - Conducted training programme on ‘Digital Financial Literacy Campaign’ under Vittiya Saksharta Abhiyan on 12th January2017.

8. The Anti-Tobacco committee of the college organized three functions, namely,(i) A motivational talk (4-11-2016), (ii) Anti-Tobacco rally in Gokulpuri Village (08-11-2016) and (iii) Poster making competition (03-11-2016) ; inside and outside the college to promote and create awareness about the ill effects of tobacco consumption on human health.
9. With a view to promote the holistic development of the students and imbibing in them the love for nature along with creating an environment for them to distress; the college has created Open Gymnasium, Meditation Hut & Acupressure Park with 17 work - out machines spread over 1800 sq.ft.area.

(C) Other Infrastructure Facilities:

- **Open Gym:** An Open Gym with 17 work-out machines is operational for students. This will ensure not just their mental development but also their physical development. The students will get an opportunity to de-stress and this will also make them more health conscious.
- **Yoga and Meditation Hut:** A Yoga and Meditation hut made of eco-friendly bamboo is also available for students.
- **Acupressure Path:** An Acupressure path with pointed stones of different sizes has also been created. The reflexology path puts the right amount of pressure on the core areas of the feet which in turn has soothing impact on the entire body.
- **Paper Recycling Unit:** A Paper Recycling unit is functional in the college. It has already started producing recycled paper. The recycled papers are used for printing in the college depending upon their supply.
- **Composting:** The College has also taken another eco-friendly initiative. This consists of converting organic waste into useful matter called compost. Compost pits have been dug up in the college which are filled up with garden waste which gets converted into nutrient rich matter.

(C) Statement of Income & Expenditure

Administration and Accounts Section of college ensures proper maintenance of available funds. In order to monitor the effective and efficient use of the available financial resources, the college seeks the requirement of purchase from the various departments like - library, computer labs and Departments in the beginning of the session along with their estimated cost and justification. The requisitions are referred to the Governing Body wherever necessary. The college Purchase Committee facilitates the purchases and strictly follows the GFR. Income/Expenditure are closely monitored by the Bursar and Section Officer (Accounts) headed by the Principal. Proper procedure is adopted for all purchases. Quotations are called and prices are compared. Every year auditing of finance, stock verification for all departments take place for an updated record. Auditing is done by internal as well as external agencies.

This college is fully funded (100%) by the Govt. of NCT of Delhi. The source of receipt/ funding is the collection of Fee from the students. The deficit is met from the Grant –In-Aid (Recurring) sanctioned by the state Govt. from time to time in every year. The deficit amount of each year after deducting the

fee collected out of total expenditure incurred during each year is shown in a Table given here under:-

CRITERIA VII: INNOVATIONS & BEST PRACTICES

(A) Environment consciousness

The pre-condition for sustainable development is environmental education and awareness. The focus of the college is to make the students conscious about environmental problem as well as solutions. Our college has taken many more initiatives in the last two years to make our campus eco-friendly.

- The college is known for wide green cover with 524 trees of 48 varieties.
- It's very important to mention here that 159 trees belong to Saptapri/*Alstonia scholarise* which is known for anti-pollution qualities.
- Trees are provided numbers for identification.
- More than 200 trees were planted in the college premises in the last two years.
- Besides this, plant varieties in herbal and rose garden has been increased to 110 and 80 respectively (increased by 10 varieties in herbal and 10 varieties in rose garden).
- Also during the year 2016 landscaping was done to enhance the beauty and greenery of the college.
- The paper produced in the paper recycling unit of the college is used by the college administration.
- The College has also taken another eco-friendly initiative. This consists of converting organic waste into useful matter called compost. Compost pits have been dug up in the college which are filled up with garden waste which gets converted into nutrient rich matter.

(B) Innovations

Many more innovations have been introduced in academic, administrative and other areas of the college during the last two years (2015-2017) which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the college.

- Yoga and Meditation Hut made of eco-friendly bamboo stuff are open to students. This will ensure not just their mental development but also their physical development. The students will get an opportunity to de-stress and this will also make them more health conscious.
- An Acupressure Path with pointed stones of different sizes is created. The reflexology path puts the right amount of pressure on the core areas of the feet which in turn has soothing impact on the entire body.
- An Open Gym with 17 work-out machines is operational for students.
- Barcode Signages are fixed in front of each class room and administrative sections for visually impaired students.

- BRAC is probably the only college across the country from where all the three wings got represented in Republic Day Camp held on 26th January 2016.
- The College organized “Delhi Best Cadet Award 2016” and Annual Fest Lakshya 2016 for NCC.
- The college celebrated its 25th Silver Jubilee year (2015-16), and a series of academic seminars, workshops & training programmes, sensitization programmes, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities were organized in the college to mark the occasion.
- The College organized Silver Jubilee All India Inter College T-20 Cricket Tournament on 21st March,2016 in association with Indian Sports Star Foundation
- The College Hindi Department has organized International Film Festival.
- The college organized student centred programme ‘ABHIVYAKTI’ on 29th Feb-1st March 2016 with students of different departments putting up display of different projects in the college.
- The College Library has facilitated membership for visual disability persons through online library from “Sugamaya Pustakalaya”.
- The University sanctioned new courses such as History (Hons), Certificate course in Sanskrit and Urdu as elective subject in 2016.
- Our college is one of the centres for School of Open learning (SOL) and Non- collegiate women’s education board.
- The college is offering BA (Hons.) Hindi, BA (Hons) Economics and Generic Elective option in physical education from this academic session 2017-18.
- A heritage walk was organised by the college Heritage Club on May 29,2017
- The Paper recycling unit has started producing its own papers. These are now being used for printing by the college administration.
- The College released a Journal named “ACADEMIA” - An International Multidisciplinary Bi-Annual Journal in Social Science, Humanities and Languages (2016).
- The college campus displays number of boards showing various geographical features of the country such as mountains, rivers, lakes etc. It’s a symbolic representation of geographical features of India with distinct parts of college campus.
- Two compost pits have been created in the college where dry leaves are kept and stored for approximately for six months. Regular watering and addition of chemicals is carried out to prepare the fertilizer which is used for the upkeep of plants of our college.
- Our college has started and Earn While You Learn initiative for students from low income families. The move provides an opportunity

to students to learn administrative works while they get financial support from the college.

Due to its interdisciplinary nature, the subject is gaining popularity especially when the world is in the grip of problems like climate change, environmental degradation and depletion, food insecurity, regional and socio-economic inequalities and socio-cultural transformations. The discipline's scope gives an advantage to the students providing diverse career options. The new techniques of data acquisition and analysis like Remote Sensing and Geographical Information System (GIS) have further widened up the career options. In addition to the class room teaching and spatial technologies practical knowledge, the Department of Geography also organizes a field trip to enrich the understanding of the subject.

Field Trip will be organized by the Department of Geography for the students of semester IV for the partial fulfillment of paper 10: Field Work and Research Methodology (Practical). The field trip is compulsory for all the students of Semester IV.

Student Activities: A programme titled **Bhu-Chetna** (Geo-awareness) is organized for conducting a number of inter-college competitions such as Geo-quiz, debate and essay writing etc. A running inter-college trophy **Aryabhata** is awarded to the best debating team.

07. Department of History

History has been and continues to be an extremely popular choice among students planning to pursue the Bachelors Degree. The discipline, at an academic level, satisfies our craving to fathom our past, the trajectories of the growth of human societies across the world and at the same time helps us unravel and analyze systematically the genesis and the root causes for many of our contemporary problems. History has always been a very popular subject for a variety of competitive examinations given its seamless cohesion with many social science disciplines. Significant shifts in the historiographical concerns in the last half a century have shifted the focus of discourse and research from documenting the plethora of ruling dynasties in Indian History and their historical contexts to a more complex paradigm of exploring the historical changes in social, economic and cultural domains. This has made the historical enquiry an enriching exercise in analyzing historical questions through interdisciplinary method. For example, Environmental history and Historical geography brings the disciplines of History and Geography together, analyses of Political systems and state structures in the past bring History and Political Science together and historical engagements with social issues like caste, gender, education and suchlike necessitates some knowledge of Sociology and social theory. As a Resource Person, Dr. Sarla Bhardwaj talk directly to the teachers who have to teach students. As a Key Resource Person, She has delivered talks to the resource persons designated to speak to the teachers who in turn have to teach in the classrooms. Going up the chain of communication gives a broader scope and a wider reach. The lectures finally reach a large number of teachers. The content of these lectures is intended to explain concepts in greater depth. The end receivers are children and the purpose is to make them like Mathematics and not be afraid of it. For this purpose she found examples from real life situations to extend familiarity. The suggested method of teaching is to draw the concept from the familiar rather than teach it as an abstract topic. Use of anecdotes, models and mathematical games help make teaching and learning an interesting process.

*As NSS coordinator Dr. Sarla Bhardwaj organized (2 times) a three day 'Gram Jagriti Yojna' in association with Jivan Shilp Inter College, during April 2015 and April 2016 at Banpur, a small village in district Lalitpur (UP). A variety of activities including awareness lectures, Nukkad Natak, cleanliness drive, women's safety, self defence for women and Building Mathematical Ability (also from some students of Mathematics of our college). Besides conducting a socio-economic survey of the village life was organized, also a study of emotional competency of village students was done. Our students mobilised the students of Jivan Shilp inter college and the villagers for cleanliness and education. About one thousand people participated in the program in total.

A number of career counselling experts belonging to different fields were invited for interaction with the students.

Mr. Naveen Joshi, the Director of VIVA group highlighted the potentials of careers in the field of Publication. The young career counsellor Mr. Ujjwal Chugh highlighted career options in the Indian Army and the opportunities emerging from the digital India program. Ajay Aggarwal, a well-known writer, spoke about job potentials in the corporate world. Mridul Gupta from United Kingdom spoke on how the students can join foreign universities for higher education. Himanshu Kalia, a well-known social worker shared his experiences of social work and motivated the students to adopt social work as a career. Dr. Sarla Bhardwaj shared information with the students about entry into school teaching. The Alumni Club President Mr. Girish Nishana highlighted different areas in the media field which the students can adopt as their career. Mr. Rahisuddin Rihan gave tips to the students about how to earn pocket money while studying.

Delhi Best Cadet Award has been one of the regular annual features and most popular programs organized by the college Alumni Club. Both Colleges and schools of Delhi are invited. The competition takes place in four categories: Senior Division and Senior Wing for the college students and Junior Division and Junior Wing for the school students. The winners of Best Cadet Awards in the Senior and Junior Division categories were cadet Sachin Kumar from Rajdhani College, Delhi University and cadet Irfan Ahmed from Geeta Colony School. The winners of Best Cadet Awards in the Senior and Junior Wing categories were cadet Hansa from Kalindi College, Delhi University and cadet Kajal Kumari from Senior Secondary co-educational School, Chilla Gaon. The Chief Guest on the occasion was Addl. DG Major General Sunil Kumar. He emphasized that NCC cadets should engaged in nation building, character building and self-confidence building along with the development of leadership qualities. Other guests of honour included the Social Worker, Mr. Himanshu Kalia and the senior journalist Mr. Pradeep Mahajan. The Jury of the event included Dr. M.S.Vats, Major Dr. S.K. Kaushik, Mr. Anil Serwal, Charanjeet Singh Mr. Vikas Mehta and Mr. Vijender Baghel.

An Awareness Program on the Empowerment and Rehabilitation of 'Divyangjan' (Differently abled Persons) was organized by the Alumni Club in September 2016, in collaboration with the Pandit Deendayal Upadhyay National Institute of Physically Handicapped. Dr. G. N. Karna, President of SDRS and the Chief Guest on the occasion, inspired the 'Divyangjan' by his own example and asked the others to be positive in their attitude. Mr. Rakesh Kumar, the Assistant Director of ESIC said that nobody is perfect and hence nobody should be considered handicapped. Meeta Singhal, the Nodal Officer of Seemapuri Satellite Centre of Pandit Deen Dayal Upadhyay Institute, spoke on Speech Therapy. Mr. Mahesh Sharma, the co-Nodal officer, highlighted different government schemes for the Divyangjan'. A documentary film on 'Divyangjan' produced by Dr. Chitra Rani was shown and a street play was staged showing the problems faced by the 'Divyangjan' in getting education and also how such problems can be overcome.

To raise awareness among students the Alumni Club organized a Poster-Making competition on the theme of 'Cleanliness and Water Conservation'. The Chief Guest in the Prize Distribution program was Mrs. Satya Sharma, the Mayor of East MCD, who distributed prizes to the winners in different categories. The Guests of Honour were Mr. Anmol Jha, a Social Worker, and Mr. Roop Chand, a Senior Artist who judged all the posters. Mansi Ruhella, Shagufta Khanam and Jyoti Tomar from Dr. Bhim Rao Ambedkar College won the 1st, 2nd and 3rd prizes, respectively. Consolation prizes were given to Mr. Manish Kumar from Jamia Millia Islamia and Prachi, Rashmi and Vinay Kapoor from Dr. Bhim Rao Ambedkar College.

In the school students category the 1st, 2nd and 3rd prizes were bagged by Arshad from G.T. Road School, Divya Sharma from Dawn Convent School and Gevakshi Jairatna from E Block Nand Nagari School. Special awards were given to Kavya from Mother Mary School, Divyanshjeet from Hansraj Memorial School, Nandini Mittal from Queen Mary School and Aniket

Sharma from Bengali School for their high quality performance.

2. ANTI-TOBACCO COMMITTEE

Aim: To make the society aware about the adverse effects of tobacco. It motivates the students and people of neighboring localities to avoid and quit smoking and other tobacco products.

Activities: The Committee organizes motivational talks, poster making competitions and Anti-tobacco rallies.

The Anti-Tobacco Committee of the College organised three functions inside and outside the college to promote and create awareness about the ill effects of tobacco consumption on human health. These were (1) Motivational talk by Dr. Manju Gupta and Monica Gupta 04.11.2016; (2) Anti-Tobacco rally in Gokalpuri Village on 08.11.2016; and (3) Poster Making Competition in the College on 03.11.2016.

Dr. Manju Gupta, ex-Head, Hindu Rao Hospital, delivered a lecture on 04.11.2016 on the ill-effects of tobacco consumption and emphasized on meditation, yoga and self-introspection to get rid of this bad habit. She said that life would be more meaningful and purposeful with right action and positive thoughts.

An anti-tobacco rally was also organised on 08.11.2016 by the college students and teachers in Gokulpur village. Posters and banners were specially made and displayed during the rally. The main message was live life fully and leave smoking.

A Poster Making Competition was held in the college on 03.11.2016 to create awareness amongst the students and to capture the expressions of different students on the posters on the subject. The students expressed their thoughts and views on tobacco consumption by making posters. The students were awarded prizes and participation certificate.

3. CENTRAL ADMISSION COMMITTEE

Admission committee is a core committee of the college. It consists of teachers-in-charge of various departments and conveners of many other admission related committees. It includes results/document verification committee, special category admissions (SC/ST/OBC/PwD, etc.) through enabling committee, sports committee, and extra-curricular activities (ECA) committee. In the college 3.5% seats are reserved under sports quota, 1.75% seats are reserved under ECA quota and 1% seats are reserved for women candidates. All other category seats are reserved according to Delhi University rules. For admission in 8 different courses of the college the University of Delhi rules and regulations are followed. As per University Notification the college constitutes its own Admission Grievance Committee to address the grievances of students and parents.

4. STUDENT COUNSELLING COMMITTEE

For the counselling of the students college has established a counseling centre. The students are informed about the facility of counselling during the orientation session of the college. It is also mentioned in the prospectus of the college.

Aim: To address the diverse set of problems faced by the heterogeneous population of the students and to resolve their conflicts and issues pertaining to academic or psychological needs. As college is an educational institution and not a mental health institution instead of pathological concerns focus is on wellness, personal growth and career of students.

These may include issues like - Resolution of personal or interpersonal problems, such as relationship issues, family conflicts etc; handling of adolescence role conflict; guidance in dealing with stresses emerging from the academic life and career adoption; counselling to cope up with problems emerging out of peer pressure and competitive life by various stress management techniques including yoga, meditation, and psychotherapy etc, Educational services through specialized programmes such as suicide awareness and prevention, drug abuse prevention, and alcohol de-addiction and tobacco cessation; education and awareness programmes about AIDS, cancer, sex related diseases and disorders etc and pre-marital counselling for preparedness to meet demands of the marital life.

Prominent personalities like Prof. Girishwar Misra, Dr. Aruna Broota, Prof. Anand Prakash and Prof. N.K. Chadha have also visited College in honour of the same initiatives. The Psychology Department of the college has facilities to conduct tests such as Interest Tests, Aptitude Tests (DAT), Anxiety Tests (STAT) and Personality Tests (16PF).

5. DEBATING SOCIETY

Aim: To make the students aware about contemporary issues and to motivate them for participating in debate competitions. It helps in their personality development.

Activities: The debating society organizes Baba Saheb Dr.Bhim Rao Ambedkar memorial 'Chal Vaijaynti' inter college debate competition every year. It helps the students to prepare and participate in debate competitions in other educational institutions.

The Debating Society of the college organised 26th Baba Saheb Dr.Bhim Rao Ambedkar memorial 'Chal Vaijaynti' inter college debate competition on 31st January 2017 on the topic of "Social Media Yuva Pidhi Ki Padhshala Hai" from different educational institutions 13 teams participated in this debate.

- Prize winners: 1st prize - Raj Kumar and Vaibhav Patel (Guru Nanak Dev Khalsa College).
- 2nd prize - Nitish Kumar Jha and Krm. Kanchan Chaudhary (Kirori Mal College).
- 3rd prize - Aman Kumar Singh and Chandan Prakash Bhardwaj (Jamia Milia Islamia).

Following the tradition, the 26th Baba Sahib, Dr. Bhim Rao Ambedkar Memorial Chal Vajayanti, Inter College debate in Hindi was organized on the 31st Jan, 2017 on the topic: **Social Media, Yuva Pidhi Ki Paathshaala Hai**” in the College auditorium. Dr. Neelam Rathi (Associate Professor Aditi College), Dr. Harinder Kumar (Associate Professor, Hindu College) and Mr. Raj Chawla (Journalist) were the members of the Jury Committee. More than one dozen teams participated in the event. ‘Chal Vajayanti’ Trophy and the first prize won by Raj Kumar and Vaibhav Patel from Guru Nanak Dev Khalsa College, Second prize went to Nitish Kumar Jha and Krm. Kanchan Chaudhary from Kirorimal College, Third Prize won by Aman Kumar Singh and Chandan Prakash Bhardwaj from Jamia Milia Islamia. There were two consolation prizes also which went to Raghav Trivedi from Dr. Bhim Rao Ambekdar College and Krishan Kumar from Ramanujan College. This competition was organized by the Debating Committee of the College.

6. DISCIPLINE COMMITTEE

Aims: The primary aim of the committee is to maintain discipline in the college. It maintains moral and ethical values among the students. It makes efforts to develop an attitude of accountability and social responsibility among the students.

Activities: The discipline committee plays a significant role for maintaining the peaceful academic environment in the college. It supports the administration in all activities and programmes of college such as Annual Day, Annual Festival, Dr. Bhim Rao Ambedkar Memorial Lecture, Abhivyakti and Sports day etc.

The focus of the committee is on resolving indiscipline related complaints in fair and just manner. The committee also sensitises the students for such issues.

7. EQUAL OPPORTUNITY CELL (EOC)

In the year 2009, DR Bhim.Rao Ambedkar College introduced Equal Opportunity Cell.

- The College provide 32-40 seats to the PWD students with a view to provide maximum education to these students
- The admissions are conducted as per Delhi University guidelines.

- The whole admission process is conducted on the ground floor for the convenience of the students.
- Dr. Shibabrat Das was the in charge of the EOC, followed by Dr. Om Mishra and Dr Neerav Adalja.
- The college has an expertise of two VH and one OH teaching faculty.
- Under the non teaching category the college has the opportunity to work with one OH in the library and one with hearing impaired in the administrative services.

Infrastructure:

- PWD students are provided with laptops soon after their admission.
- Visually challenged students are provided with screen reading software.
- PWD students are facilitated with separate space on the ground floor of the library.
- The college has the facility of Braille books related to the student's syllabus.
- The college has also the facility of Scanner which converts the content of the book to Audio help.
- OH students are provided with wheel chairs for easy accesability in the college.
- Ramps are constructed in the entry of every important place (library, canteen, entrance, teaching blocks, and toilets) of the college premise to make the movement of the PWD students more mobile.
- Special toilet has been constructed for the PWD students.
- Censor has been introduced at the entry of every room which helps the VH students to identify the room through their smart mobile phones.

Highlights

- All classes for the PWD students are held in ground floor to obtain maximum attendance.
- PWD students are initiated to participate in Sports, Drama, Dance, Fashion shows, Music, Poster making, Instrumental, Slogan writing and other co-curricular activities.
- Team Shamyog has been formed by a group of students who take the initiative to help the students of EOC in different fields both academic and non academic activity as a part of INCLUSIVE EDUCATION.
- The PWD students are exempted from any form of fees.
- The PWD students are provided a separate room on the ground floor to write their exams with an extra one hour writing time.

Activities

- Special initiative is taken by Dr K.K Sharma (sports teacher) as well principal of the college to train the PH students in different games such

as archery, javelin, hand ball, cricket and athletics and a separate sports event is held for them every year in the college during the annual sports day

- PH students of this college are encouraged to participate in different inter and intra college competition. These students have made the college proud by bringing many prizes in different field of sports.
- The college celebrates annual day separately for these students showcasing the cultural talent of the PWD students. They also share the stage with other students during the Cultural Fest of the College.
- The PWD students are also provided the opportunity to travel with the students and teachers for excursions, picnic and projects held by the college.
- Short films have also been directed on PH students by other students of the College.
- Since 2014 the college has introduced a special prize as a All round performer for the PWD students. In 2014-15 Sundar Lal Khatri (OH) was awarded with this award, followed by Noor Mohamad (VH) in 2015-16 and Sujit Gautam (OH) in the year 2016-17.
- The strength of the college is its empathy towards the Differently Abled Students.

8. RED RIBBON CLUB

Red Ribbon is globally recognized symbol for HIV/AIDS awareness. It aims for Solidarity with people living with HIV and AIDS. The college has established this club keeping in view the Govt. of India proposal of establishing a network with Universities and educational institutions through red ribbon clubs. The Red Ribbon Club of the college enrolls new students every year.

Aims: Red Ribbon Club objective is to instill among all the students values of service, developing healthy life styles and increase access to safe and adequate quantities of blood to all the needy by promotion of regular voluntary blood donation. Apart from this, Red Ribbon Club aims at harnessing the potential of the youth by equipping them with correct information on mental health, substance abuse, nutrition and reproductive and sexual health and building their capacities as peer educators in spreading messages on positive health behaviour in an enabling environment.

Activities: The club organizes blood donation and AIDS awareness camps at regular intervals. On 10th January 2017, a blood donation camp was organized in the college in collaboration with the Delhi State AIDS Control Society. Events like Nukkad Natak, Kavita Paath, Football and volleyball matches were also organized. A debate competition was conducted on 'The Role of Youth with Reference to HIV AIDS'.

9. GENDER SENSITIZATION AND DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

- The Gender Sensitization and Women Development Committee organized a Three day **Workshop** from 29th-31st October 2014 on “**Depiction of Women’s Empowerment in Hindi Cinema (2006-2014)-An Analysis**”. Ms. Kiran Chauhan doing her PhD research from Lady Irwin College, Delhi University interviewed our girl students to study the perception of audience. The students filled up a structured questionnaire on the topic and it was a fruitful exercise.
- The Gender Sensitization Committee organized its programme “**Gender Bender**” on 9th – 10th April 2015. The Committee organized Poster making Competition and Slogan Writing Competition on 9th April 2016 for the students. A talk was organized on 10th April 2016 on **Impact of Non-Communicable Diseases on Gender** by Dr. Geetanjali Sharma, Public Health Expert, PWC, Gurgaon and on **Gender Sensitization** by Dr. Rachna Sharma, Associate Prof., Satyawati College, University of Delhi and **Women Empowerment and Safety** by Ms. Kiran Chauhan, Lady Irwin College, and University of Delhi.
- Our college officially launched **Himmat App**. It is an App by Delhi Police for the safety of Women & Girls. Demonstration was done by Delhi Police in the college with girl students downloading the app & how to use it.
- The college celebrated "**International Women's Day**" on 8th March 2016. Ms.Rachna Bimal, Assistant Prof., Satyawati College gave lecture on "**Women's Strengths in today's challenging times**".
- **Self Defence training** was given to 65 girls students from 1st-20th September 2016 by Delhi Police.
- **Second Self Defence training** was given to 40 Girls Students from 22nd -31st March 2017 by Delhi Police.
- **20 Students** (Both Boys & Girls) were selected as “**Gender Champions**” in the college, based on UGC Guidelines. Gender Champions are leaders who will facilitate an enabling environment in the college where girls are treated with dignity and respect Feb 2017.

10. MONITORING COMMITTEE FOR INTERNAL ASSESSMENT

As per the University Guidelines the committee includes the chairperson (Principal), the convener, the co-convener and members. This committee is constituted every year by the staff council of the college.

Aim: To ascertain that the marks of internal assessment in respect of every student irrespective of the course or the year are uploaded on the university website not only within time but minus the discrepancy (if any) made at the level of the concerned teacher also.

Activities: The committee has channelized its work in the following manner - A notice from the committee well within a time in each semester requesting every teacher to submit the internal assessment marks mentioning those head wisely 10+10+5. Five marks for attendance and the rest 20 for test/ project/ assignment on the University guidelines, time to time. It ensures that the marks allotted by a teacher are duly moderated by his/her respective departmental moderation committee (displayed simultaneously) before submission. In case, this moderation committee or the teacher revises the marks they should be duly countersigned by the board members, as well as for the relaxation/ concession/ weightage for students in NCC/ NSS/ Cultural /Sports on medical/ there is an Attendance Committee which is supposed to guide the teachers to these levels. After the teacher had undergone all this exercise, he/she submits the internal assessment to the office where two officials from the non-teaching staff type the marks given by the teacher and get them cross-checked by the concerned teacher and the student also. To cross check that the criteria had undergone the correct procedure, it is then the Monitoring Committee that ascertains 'correctness' before eventually it get uploaded to the University portal. The committee over the years worked hard to ascertain that it becomes '3-D accurate' and had set a record of zero error on its part.

11. NATIONAL SERVICE SCHEME (NSS)

Aim: National Service Scheme (NSS) aims at inculcating the spirit of volunteerism among students and teachers through sustained community interaction and development. It shows how to combine knowledge and action to achieve results which are conducive to community development.

Activities: The NSS unit of the college has emerged as a modest but credible linkage involving more than 100 student's volunteers. Social service initiatives include programmes in the surrounding locality. Special camps are organised and programmes like orientation, awareness campaigning, blood donation camps, cleanliness, sanitation drives, personality developments, and life skills education are undertaken.

1. **SCHOOL PROJECT** In December 2015, 20 students of the college accompanied by three teachers from the college went to nearby 8 Government Schools to guide the students of the 12th class of the schools for university admissions. They were also given counseling on the way to

score appropriate marks for getting admission in various university colleges. They were also made aware of documents required at the time of admission in university colleges. Last year's cut offs of admission to Delhi University colleges for various streams were also explained to them along with the relevance of various cut offs. The school teachers appreciated the efforts of the college team and requested to continue the exercise for the coming years also. The teacher who guided the whole program was Dr. Sarla Bhardwaj (Programme Officer of NSS) and other teachers who accompanied the college team were Dr. Ritu Aggarwal and Dr. Rajbala Gautam.

- 2. VISIT TO BANPUR DURING APRIL 2016** The most important event of NSS was the rural camp organized in Banpur – a village in MP for 4 days from 18th April to 22nd April. The team of 41 students along with four teachers of the college stayed in Jeevan Shilp Inter College, Banpur and did social work in village Banpur and neighbouring villages such as Chilla, Billa and Kuan. The journey of the entire camp was very enthusiastic. The aim of the camp was to bring youth of the college in direct contact with the rural people, understand their problems and to make efforts to enlighten the rural people to look ahead, shed off antisocial, unhealthy habits and improve their lives. NSS volunteers performed '*Nukkad Natak*' on the streets of Banpur and appealed everyone to send their ward to schools and stop the consumption of drugs and liquor. The slogan of the team was "*Shiksha se Ho Gram Vikas, Gram Vikas Se Desh Vikas*". The message was well conveyed to everyone. Self defence training was also imparted free of cost to the student of the college and schools of the village. Jagriti-2016, the NSS day of the college was celebrated in Banpur itself. The event turned out well. SHO Banpur, Head of Billa Chilla Village, Banpur Village Head, Other Reputed persons of the Village Banpur attended the Function. The best part of it was that the students and villagers of Banpur and students from Jeevan Shilp Inter College also participated. Dance performances, group discussions, essay writing, poetry competition, drawing competitions and many other competitions were organized for the students. The NSS volunteers left an imprint on everyone's heart and promised to serve the society throughout their lives. The Society of NSS strongly believes that 'the Best way to live life is do service of the society' and the NSS volunteers proved it through their Banpur Trip. The teachers who went to Banpur were Dr. Sarla Bhardwaj (NSS Coordinator), Dr. KK Sharma, Dr. DK Pandeya and Dr. Sakshi Vasudeva. The students of Jeevan Shilp Inter College and Vikas Jain (MD Jeevan Shilp Inter College, Banpur) also joined hands with the team from the College for the social work in village Banpur and other neighbouring villages. The guiding hands behind all the success was Dr. G. K. Arora (the Principal of the College) and Dr. Sarla Bhardwaj (NSS Coordinator).

3. VISIT TO OLD AGE HOME IN SHAHDARA DURING JULY 2016

NSS team of the college along with Nukkad Natak Team and cultural team of the college went to nearby old age home in Shahdara. The students of the college and another NGO performed various cultural programmes there and talked to old age residents. The students also held cleanliness drive in the old age home. 40 students of NSS and teacher coordinator Dr. Sarla Bhardwaj and Dr. DK Pandeya participated in the programme.

4. VISIT TO OLD AGE HOME ON 15 AUGUST TO CELEBRATE INDEPENDENCE DAY WITH THEM

One of the most important events of NSS was the visit to old age home on 15 August, 2016 when most of the people sit in the comfort of the home to enjoy Independence Day holiday. Around 50 students went to the old age home. The convener of the event was Dr. Sarla Bhardwaj and Dr. Sakshi Vasudeva also went with the college team. Students prepared various cultural programmes and also decided to enquire about the status and life of people staying in old age home. Students and teachers reached old age home in the morning at 9:30 am. Students and teachers of the college had their breakfast with the residents of old age home. Flag hoisting ceremony was performed in the old age home. Various cultural programs were presented in collaboration with NGO FACE. There were two solo dance performances and two group dance performances by the students of the college. As Janamashtmi was arriving, the students of the college also danced on a religious song. Then a team of Nukkad Natak performed a skit. Students also played some games with the residents of the old age home. All this brought a smile on the faces of the people staying in old age home. Students of the college also received certificates for their social work in Banpur from the hands of residents of old age home. Students and the teachers also involved in small informal chit chat with old people. The Students talked to old people there to know about their life and various challenges. Students also learnt important lessons from the life experiences of people of old age home. Some of the students also shared their personal mobile numbers. At around 4 pm, students bid good bye to them and promised to come back in the future with more useful programmes.

The NSS Unit of the college with Dr. Ravindra Singh as programme Officer has about 125 volunteers and associated teachers Dr. Anita Srivastava, Dr. Indiar Misra and Dr. Avtar Singh. These volunteers are involved in awareness generation, cleanliness drive, poster and slogan writing competitions and community services etc.

The major activities were organized with active involvement of Dr. Arvind Kumar Yadav, Mr. Krantideep Verma, Mr. Binod Kumar, Mr. Kumar Satyam, Dr. Seema Rani and Mr. Vinayak Ram during this year include.

An orientation programme for NSS volunteers (22nd September 2016); NSS day celebration and slogan writing competition on the theme of “Ill Effects of Drug Addiction (Substance Abuse)” (26th September 2016); Voters Enrolment Drive (6th September, October 6th and 20th, 2016). In addition, Five NSS volunteers attended training programme on “Enrolment Process of Youth Electors” on 29th September, 2016. The NSS Volunteers also Celebrated “Rashtriya Ekta Saptah” from 31st October- 6th November 2016; Observed “Vigilance Awareness Week”, and organized debate competition on “Role of Youth in Curbing Corruption” in collaboration with Oriental Bank of Commerce on 2nd November, 2016. Programme on “Emergency Response Preparedness” to minimize loss of life, reduce damages in the situation of disaster and emergencies (10th November 2016), wherein Kunwar Rajal, Pawan Kumar and Ms. Neha were the resource person (10th November 2016). The NSS unit also conducted training programme on “Digital Financial Literacy Campaign under Vittiya Saksharta Abhiyan” on 12th January 2017 with Mr. Rohit Bahri, Senior Manager, Oriental Bank of Commerce as the resource person.

12. NORTH EAST CELL

The cell was constituted on 28th August 2012 for the students of North Eastern States of India in the College. The objective of the Cell is to generate awareness and enhance understanding of diverse cultures.

Activities: The cell organizes meetings and interactions for the students with the Principal and teachers of the college. It renders assistance to the concerned students during the time of college admission. The committee facilitates the foreign students in enrolling with FRRO. It also offers personal counseling, if desired, so as to encourage and motivate them to help themselves become responsible individuals. The Cell actively participated in the “Abhyabhakti” organized by the College on 25th February and 1st March, 2016 by putting up a stall. The stall was awarded the “**Most Vibrant Pavilion**”.

The Cell organised a cultural programme (Bihu dance) and slide presentation on society and culture of Assam in the Annual Departmental festival ‘Macro-Nomics’ of the Department of Commerce and Department of Economics on 2nd March, 2017. 13. PROSPECTUS COMMITTEE

Aim: The aim of this committee is to frame prospectus of the college before the admission session every year. As the college prospectus is a document for potential (prospective) admission seekers, it usually contains information about the institution and the available courses, including information on how to apply and what are the benefits of joining the college.

Activities: The prospectus committee prepares prospectus well in advance of beginning of admission session. It includes - Chairperson's address, Principal's message; information about the college & courses offered; general admission information; choice based credit system (CBCS); professional and other courses offered by the College; schedule of fees and dues; college infrastructure & in-house utility services; learning beyond classroom: towards a holistic development; campus life: information and guidelines; major achievements in academics and sports; year-wise results for each course (last four years); list of teachers; college administration & at the end the list of college committees.

14. MAINTENANCE AND HYGIENE COMMITTEE

Aim: This Committee is committed to take care of all the aspects of the college look, physical appearance and overall upkeep of the campus as well as the near vicinity. This committee has important role in creating teaching/ learning environs.

Activities: This committee makes efforts for keeping everything in good condition for the overall betterment of the college. It tries to create conditions or practices conducive to maintain healthy surroundings – inside and immediate outside the college campus.

15. PLACEMENT CELL

Aim: The motive of this cell is to provide quality placements to the students of the college. The Placement Cell of our College works in close association with the Central Placement Cell of University of Delhi which registers College Students and invites Companies for recruiting UG Students. The College Placement Cell also provides a platform to the recruiting companies which come to our college to induct fresh graduates in their origination.

Activities: The Placement Cell in our college is highly active and makes arrangements for smooth conduct of the interviews, GDs, face to face interactions between students and potential recruiters on the campus. The Placement Cell also organizes seminars, workshops which help the students in different placement related activities. For conducting these seminars and workshops; services of trained professionals are availed of & this has benefitted the students immensely in securing good placements. The topics of some recent workshops are: - (i) Writing a Professional CV; (II) Preparing for Group Discussion & Interviews and (iii) Facing an Interview Board. Another important task of the Placement cell is to prepare a Placement Brochure. This year too, the team has prepared an Online Placement Brochure which is being sent to HR Managers of Companies, NGOs and other potential recruiters.

16. WORKLOAD COMMITTEE

This committee monitors the workload of each department in terms of students-teacher ratio and papers offered by different departments.

17. TIME TABLE COMMITTEE ACTIVITIES

Aim: To prepare master time table of the college in time i.e. before start of semesters.

Activities: On the basis of workload the committee makes allotment of time-slots for lectures, practical periods and tutorials. 18. VERIFICATION COMMITTEE ACTIVITIES

Aim: To determine the correct valuation of assets. It finds out whether assets are in existence. It works to detect fraud and error, if any. It finds out whether there is adequate control system regarding acquisition, utilization and disposal of assets. It ensures that the assets have been recorded properly.

Activities: The committee makes physical verification of the consumable & non-consumable items. It conducts physical verification of the repaired & replaced items. At the end of the year, closing stock of consumable & non-consumable items is verified. List of non- consumable items, which are not working and serviceable, are also prepared by care taker, verified. Verification of items is always made in the presence of the officer responsible for the custody of the inventory being verified. The committee checks the purchased goods physically with the no. of items on the bill. The committee also checks repaired & replaced items physically. The convener of the committee puts signature on stamp designed for the purpose.

19. COLLEGE MAGAZINE COMMITTEE ACTIVITIES (2016-17)

Aim: In order to give expression to the creative ideas of our college fraternity including faculty and the students, an annual college magazine is published

every year ever since the college was established in 1991. It is titled as 'Chetna'.

20. ACADEMIC DEVELOPMENT SOCIETY FOR STUDENT (ADSS) ACTIVITIES

The Committee was constituted in September 2015 with "the holistic development of students" as its major objective. In order to fulfill the objective of an all-round grooming and development of our students, the committee organizes a variety of programmes and events having a multi-disciplinary approach. Computer Labs equipped with ten 5KVA and two 10KVA online UPS with 1 hrs. power backup. The complete college campus is Wi-Fi enabled with UTM Box security system.

The College has established an IT Hub including 80 computers and 01 server with the latest configuration. The college received 813 laptops for students and 20 laptops for teachers from the University, which were distributed to first-year students and faculty members. To improve IT infrastructure and teaching methodology, we have installed 27 multimedia projectors in the classrooms including four labs. The 19 Laptops were provided by the University of Delhi for Power Point Presentation in the class rooms. The college is in the process to make students attendance online.

23. ANNUAL REPORT COMMITTEE ACTIVITIES

24. CCTV COMMITTEE ACTIVITIES

The College is well equipped with CCTV surveillance. Recently the college has installed high quality CCTV cameras in order to be more vigilant towards ragging and other such activities in the best interest of students, especially girl students. Total 57 cameras are installed at various places and cover almost the entire campus which are equipped with latest IP based and HD quality along with Online UPS for power back-up and recording facility. For getting a close-up view of the inner side of campus and playground, a PTZ camera of 12x Zoom is also installed.

25. YOGA COMMITTEE ACTIVITIES

- The Committee was constituted in October 2015 with the motto “health is real wealth”. In order to fulfill the objective of making students healthy and lead a stress free life, the committee actively promotes and inculcates the importance of making yoga as an essential part of life .The Committee comprised of 18 faculty members and students.
- The most important step of the committee in achieving its objective has been in organizing free of cost voluntary yoga sessions for students every day from 7:45am to 8:45am in the college premises under a trained yoga instructor from the Bharatiya Yog Sansthan.
- To enhance participation and encourage regularity, the committee organizes a monthly felicitation program that rewards students who are regular and have embraced yoga as part of their life. This felicitation program is conducted regularly in the first week of every month and

the students are given appreciation letters and symbolic prizes by the committee.

- The committee, in its endeavour to contribute to the mission of making a healthy India celebrated the International Day of Yoga on 21st June 2015 by organising a mega yoga event in its premises. This event included a spectacular yoga performance by more than 450 NCC cadets from various DU Colleges and schools and was attended by eminent personalities. The event was covered by the Rajya Sabha channel on same day.
- This practice was followed in 2016 also and the second International Day of Yoga was celebrated on 21st June 2016 in the college premises with students and faculty members performing various yoga asana.
- To popularize yoga among students the yoga committee, in collaboration with Samyog foundation conducts yoga workshops on regular basis in college premises.

27. STUDENT WELFARE/FEE CONCESSION COMMITTEE

ACTIVITIES

This Committee works to promote the education of the poor and needy students by giving financial assistance to a number of students from different departments. In current academic session, the Committee recommended 217 students for distribution of Students' Aid Fund (SAF) on the basis of categories of annual income of their parents including 6 students of ward quota of the College. However, keeping in view the humanitarian approach, social justice and human rights, 14 students were recommended for special financial assistance on a request made by them in order to ensure continuity of their studies. In addition, special library support is also provided under SAF by arranging books to the applicants as per their requirement.

28. CULTURAL COMMITTEE

The College cultural committee known for its vibrant activities has made specific contribution during the year 2016-17. It functions more like a Public Relation dept giving our students an opportunity to connect with multicultural world lying outside the college.

HELP DESK 2016 To assist **students** seeking admission in the college, help desk was put up for around one month. The coordinator teachers were Dr. Sarla Bhardwaj (Cultural Convener), Dr. Nalin Kumar (Admission Committee Coordinator) and Dr. KK Sharma (Director of Physical Education). Team of 40 students was formed and aspirant students were helped. Information was provided to students about various course options in the college and students seeking admission in the process of admission were guided about filling of admission forms, attestation of admission related documents, mandatory affidavits for getting admission and depositing fees. Separate arrangements were made for Special Children to help them to avoid all inconveniences. Students who took part in the help desk were made to experience "Earn While you learn" by the college administration. All activities were under the guidance of principal of the college Dr. G.K. Arora.

The opening day of the session 2016-17 began with the orientation programme.
